Source for all indicators is U.S. Census Bureau, 2006 American Community Survey (ACS). The ACS, conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, now provides detailed demographic and socioeconomic estimates for cities with populations of 65,000 and above on an annual basis. **Similar annual data on smaller cities and towns is not yet available from the Census Bureau.** Beginning in the fall of 2008, three-year average estimates (2005-2007 data) for towns with a population of 20,000 or more will become available from the ACS.
